"WE WAS ROBBED"

Church members rally round to help burgled family

n 11th August 2011 whilst on holiday, we received a phone call from our neighbour to say he had just discovered a man attempting to walk off with our lawn mower! I suggested to our neighbour that he better check that no-one had been in the house, which was when we discovered that the house, as well as the shed, had been burgled.

As we were in Northern Ireland at the time, it was over 24 hours before we arrived home. The police had already searched for fingerprints and also warned us about the offensive graffiti on the walls. We drove down the M6 wondering what we would find, with the horrible feeling that

others had been ransacking "even in our house and pillaging our possessions.

On arriving home, we were trouble we greeted with an avalanche of offers of help from our friends in Dewsbury Evangelical Church where we

are members. We were able to leave our three girls with one family while we assessed the damage and had an initial clean up. Another couple came and helped tidy up, applying numerous chemicals to the walls to remove or at least make illegible the graffiti.

Someone else arrived to help, bringing with them a cake to encourage us! It wasn't long before the house was made liveable again. In the days following this, there were many more offers of help such as meals and taking the children out. This allowed us to get on with the tidying, sorting and speaking to the police. For all this help we were really grateful.

As we reflected on the unpleasantness of being burgled, we thought about Jesus' words: "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." (John 16:33). These words reminded us that Jesus tells us

> to be realistic about life in this world - there will be trouble. which includes burglary and all that goes with it - the invasion, vandalism, theft, inconvenience, hassle, worry, fear and insults. These words also encouraged us as they reminded us that even in the midst of trouble, we could have peace,

and take heart because Jesus has overcome the world by his death and resurrection. Because of this it is great to be able to look forward to living with him in a world without sin or suffer-

WHAT ON EARTH IS AN "EVANGELICAL"?

argon; it can be very handy, but also a bit of a pain! And if there is one group who are good at jargon... it's Christians! But there is some jargon that is actually really helpful, which when understood, packages longer meanings into a single word. However, these can also be a cause for misunderstanding or teasing. Maybe some of you have come across it like:

"Pastor? What flavour is he?" "Cheese and onion!"

The church I grew up in (where my dad is a cheese and onion!), used to have above the door the words 'Brighouse Evangelical'. You can imagine some of the youth coming in and out of the building saying, "What's evan-jelly-cal?" No, it's not a new flavour! It is a word which we can see comes from the Bible. "Now these are

the gifts Christ gave to the church: the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, and the pastors and teachers." Ep.4v11 Here the word evangelist simply means 'a giver of good news'. Again we see it helpfully used in Acts 21:8 where the apostle Paul stays at the

home of 'Philip the Evangelist'. Philip was a successful teacher of the Good News of Jesus. He had come across a man reading the Old Testament book of Isaiah. He stopped to explain to him the Good News about Jesus, using the very book that was being read, the book of Isaiah. You can read about this in Acts 8:35b. So an evangelist is

one who has a mission to tell people the Good News about Jesus.

"What's the Good News, then?" you may ask. It is to have faith in the Lord Jesus, trusting in him for the forgiveness of your sins so that you can have a relationship with God. This is not something that we can achieve on our own, or work at; it is a precious gift!

So what about the word 'evangelical'? This is simply an extension of the above, and it became a label given to the churches and believers back in the 1700s. These groups of 'evangelicals' were known for believing in the Good News of Jesus or 'Gospel', and proclaiming it. Whatever church you go to, or whatever label you may choose, I think all Christians should be 'evangelical' in their thinking? Christ has freed you if you trust in him! So in other words, to be 'evangelical' means simply to be believers and proclaim the Good News which is, "... Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners..." 1Timothy 1v15.
